Full S.T.E.A.M. Ahead!

On a mid-January afternoon, one of the Preschool students tugs at her dad's arm. "Daddy, can we please stay after school for the activity?" The sign up for the Family STEAM Activity had been up on the bulletin board for a couple of weeks, but it wasn't until she saw her teachers setting up stations with safety goggles, giant ramps made from foam pool noodles, and a machine that looked like it wore a big, clear top hat that she knew where she just HAD to be.

Lucy Gilmore of Cape Cod Children's Place brought boxes of materials to the PK and Kindergarten rooms for a free STEAM Activity for our youngest students and their grownups. STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math. More than a half dozen different discovery-based learning stations were set up for young scientists and engineers to explore. We inflated balloons with carbon dioxide, tested creations made from recycled items in a vertical wind tunnel, and predicted how water affects different materials.

The program was made possible through a grant by the Massachusetts Dept. of Early Education and Care and funding through the TCS CPC, a parent group that supports our early childhood classrooms through fundraising and special events.


Amazing Polar Animals
